Craig A Hoy entertainingly mcd the event and introduced the Minister of Arts in Queensland the Honourable Leeanne Enoch MP who spoke of Thancoupie's lasting cultural legacy and contributions to CIAF.

The Bursary recipient was Indigenous Visual Artist and Performer Zane Saunders who is a descendant of Butchulla, Gunggari and Jarrowia Peoples of Southern Queensland and lives in Kuranda, North of Cairns. Zane is using the Bursary to develop printmaking.

The 2022 Bursary recipients, he Pormpuraaw artists, the Director of the Pompuraaw Art and Culture Centre, Paul Jakubowski and Theo Tremblay Master printer, all spoke on the practice development and outcomes of the monoprint making at the Pompuraaw Art and Culture Centre.

Last year's TBF recipients, the Artists from Pormpuraaw, used the funding to support a series of monoprinting workshop in April at the Pormpuraaw Arts and Culture Centre with Master printer Theo Tremblay. Theo shares an overview of the monoprinting workshops.

"I'm familiar with the Thaayorre people, the traditional owners, and Muncken and Wik clan groups living on country, near the ocean and estuaries of Pormpuraaw, having been to the remote community dozens of times to provide workshops in printmaking and graphic design. The Pormpuraaw Artss and Culture Centre is comprised of the former ranger station and a purpose-built art gallery/office with adjoining art room the size of a small double garage. Groups gather with their dogs each morning for tea, biscuits, and conversation, and to watch the Art Mob produce paintings, prints, wearable textiles and 'ghostnet' sculptures.

The Centre was originally established by Irma Ashwin in 2005. Paul Jakubowski has been the Director for the past eleven years. There have been a number of informative publications on language, legends and bush foods have been published. Printmaking has been a successful adjunct to programs expressing personal and cultural objectives. Pormpuraaw is currently the only community north of Cairns which features printmaking as a major arts media. At the same time Torres Strait Island print shops in Badu Island and Kubin (Moa Island) are mainstreaming vinyl cut printmaking, exploiting well-established carving traditions.

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he 2022 Thancoupie Bursary award has been a major boost in benefitting artists of various backgrounds. Monoprinting, as a medium, embraces many forms and is accessed by artists of many skills or those which may be limited. Colour, shape and texture can be investigated at a level not experienced by other means using a variety of materials and machines through repeated pressings of the same plate, adding and subtracting stencils and, well just 'playing intelligently'. Long-term printmakers Mylene Holroyd and Sid Bruce Shortjoe delighted in extending their storytelling into another medium. Mylene chose the theme 'Ready for Work' to highlight youth preparedness for the 'Sunrise Job Find' group in Pormpuraaw, which inspired the work. She also used family outing themes including a family fishing outing in a motorboat (see photos

Three artists of the same family, Alma and Marlene Norman and Mavis Benjamin were asked to cut shapes in acetate and use these to paint and place against hand-coloured backgrounds, imitating designs from earlier patterns and textile designs (see photos).

Elder artists Kylie Arkwookerum and Katherine Ngallamatta, regulars of PAC and eager project participants, used designs familiar to them in previous and ongoing paintings.

The artists and their new medium created interest with their friends, FIFO tradespeople, teachers, hospital staff, army and police liaison officers and Council staff, curious to see how the medium worked.

Through the continuation of traditional storytelling by way of incorporating monoprinting as an additional medium to extend artists' skills, their works have been displayed at the local art Centre and major national Indigenous art exhibitions. In 2023 their monoprints were featured at the Cairns Indigenous Art Fair, Darwin Art Festival and Tanarnthi Indigenous Art Festival (Tandanya Art Centre, Adelaide).

I want to take this opportunity to personally thank the Thancoupie Bursary Award team for allowing me to undertake this monoprint project and the many other projects we have planned, financed and delivered together. I hope to continue to contribute opportunities in the graphic arts to deserving artists / cultural practitioners, respecting the persevering spirit of our dear Thancoupie.
